- To improve teaching so that overall standards are at least good
- Improve rates of progress in reading, writing and maths in all year groups
- To develop the curriculum so that it meets the needs of all groups of learners for future life
- To improve whole-school overall attendance rate to 97% and PA rate to 3%

It is for schools to decide how the Pupil Premium, allocated to schools per FSM pupil, is spent, since they are best placed to assess what additional provision should be made for the individual pupils within their responsibility.
