What does the NSPCC do?

The NSPCC is a group of people from all over the country working together to help keep children safe.

The NSPCC believes all children have the right to:

- √ speak out and be heard
- √ be safe
- √ get help when they need it.



1 in 20 children under the age of 11 have been neglected

Neglect is when a child isn't loved and cared for or may not have a safe place to live, enough food to eat or clean clothes.

Childline is a service of the NSPCC, and children can get in touch whatever their worry.



How does the NSPCC help?

Speak out. Stay safe.

The NSPCC has a team of specially trained staff and volunteers who visit primary schools across the UK with Buddy, the schools mascot.

They share important messages in a fun, interactive way – helping children to understand what abuse is and who they can turn to for help if they need it.



Local NSPCC centres

There are special centres across the country in England, Northern Ireland, Scotland and Wales that help children and their families to have happier lives.

In these centres we help children feel safe, comforted and more able to talk about their worries and feelings.



The NSPCC helpline

If an adult is worried that a child is in danger, they can call the NSPCC. We're here 24 hours a day making sure children are kept safe.



Lobbying government

This means we talk to the government and ask them to change laws to make our society safer for children.

We do this because we want all children to be safe and happy. With your support, together we can stop children being abused.




Childline

If children or young people are worried, they can always talk to Childline, a service just for children where they can get support if they're scared or worried about anything.

Children and young people contact Childline for all sorts of reasons. Whatever the worry, Childline will listen carefully and trust whatever they are told. No problem is too big or small and they can get in touch every day of the year, at any time.

How raising money can help.


£25

could pay for a dolls house which children use during counselling sessions to explain how they're feeling.



£50

could pay for a sand tray. Playing with sand can help a child feel calm and happy again.



£150

could pay for us to answer 30 calls from adults and parents who phone the NSPCC helpline when they are worried about a child.



£400

could pay for a Childline counsellor



£600

could cover the cost of our Schools Service to reach one primary school helping children to speak out and stay safe.



£1,600

could recruit and train a volunteer Childline counsellor, who in their first year will be able to help up to 250 children whatever their worry.



£2,800

could help us to recruit, train and support a volunteer for their first year with the Schools Service.



£4,000

could provide one-to-one therapy for a child for a year, to help them recover from abuse.
