Practical Matters for children's return Monday 8th March:

- 1. Full-school (Winter) uniform for all; except Y4 and Nursery children. Y4 will need to wear their school PE kit – with bottoms and school sweatshirt over to keep them warm. This includes black shoes.
- 2. All children with long hair to be securely tied back we do not want to bring an infection of head-lice into school!
- 3. Children can only bring in a water-bottle, packed lunch (if applicable) and their reading book in from home.
- 4. All children who receive Free School Meals (FSM) will receive them. This includes all those children:
 - Who are in YR Y2: Universal Free School Meals

• Who are in Y3 – Y6: Benefits-related Free School Meals

NB. Please inform the school office if you think your child is now eligible to receive FSM.

March Feast Days


St David – 1st March


He is the patron saint of Wales.
